#### A Consistent Calling Through Changing Seasons

An interview with Christine Okken by Amber Dowd

any of you may recognize Christine Okken as Harry Kelm's Executive Assistant. But did you know that Christine has spent 30 years working in pastoral ministry? We're so thankful to be able to share her story—and wisdom—with you!

Christine and her husband Terry have lived in Edmonton, Alberta for 25 years, attending and working at McKernan Baptist Church for most of that time. She also spent early adulthood in Sioux Falls, South Dakota, where she attended Sioux Falls Seminary and worked at Hillcrest Church.

#### What led you to attend Sioux Falls Seminary as a young adult?

I enrolled in response to an encouragement from Jim Schneider, who was the Dean of Students at NABC. I had a wonderful undergraduate college experience and felt God calling me to similarly serve students in a college setting. Sensing that counseling might be the route to take, Jim recognized that seminary would be a good fit for me. I ended up loving it!

# Did you end up working with students on college campuses as you had anticipated?

No! I got involved with the youth ministry at Hillcrest Church, where Harry Kelm was the senior pastor at that time. When the Youth Director stepped down, Harry approached me to take the position. This came as a surprise since I was planning on working in a college setting, not a

church setting. But God confirmed through my love for the kids that this was His leading. I learned that we sometimes come into things with certain expectations, but God shows He has different plans in mind!

Harry and Cindy became invaluable mentors and my "family" away from home as I learned about the life of ministry. Although I'm a self-starter and work hard, their influence helped me better understand myself, grow closer to God, and taught me to love the church and serve with faithfulness.

Initially some were hesitant about seeing a woman in this role, but I felt God leading me to not push against them and to simply serve faithfully. It was a beautiful experience to later have people in the church affirm my consistency. I see now that God used my seven years at Hillcrest to lay a foundation for an enduring and successful youth ministry.

# After your seven years at Hillcrest Church, what happened next in your life of ministry?

Well, we were expecting our first child and had to decide what to do. Terry was willing to stay with our daughter while I worked, but I felt God leading me to stay home. We moved back to Edmonton and Terry was hired on with NABC (now Taylor). I noticed that the sense of calling to ministry remained in me even though I had stepped out of that space. God provided the opportunity to teach youth ministry classes on an adjunct basis at Taylor College and Seminary. It was just right for that season.

Then came a difficult ending at Taylor, and we were pressed to rely on God for what was next. As we prayed Terry suggested we look into youth ministry again, even though we now had three little kids. It turned out that the youth pastor at McKernan Baptist Church was leaving, and God opened the door when our Senior Pastor asked us to lead the youth ministry as a couple. We loved working together and our giftings complement each other really well. During our ten years of leading together, our children were loved and embraced by the leaders and students.

Eventually Terry was called out of youth to be the Executive Pastor of McKernan. I continued but sensed a new season coming as well. God led me to wait and allow time to raise up the next leaders. I then filled in for our Pastoral Care Pastor during her Sabbatical, which eventually became a part-time job that we shared.

I appreciate how God worked with my personality as I stepped into this role. I like to try things out before I commit, and it was neat how God gave me a trial period before I committed to the role longer-term.

#### It seems as an Executive Assistant you are in an entirely different season yet again. How did God lead you to where you are now?

In recent years we went through a season of personal crisis, and God showed us it was time for me to step away from formal ministry and take a leave of absence. With Terry facing serious health issues and all four of our parents passing away in a short span of time, my emotional space for pastoral ministry had diminished. I entered a season of healing and placing myself under God's care.

During this time, Harry Kelm became the Executive Director of NAB. He approached me to pray about working as his Executive Assistant. Working from home alongside a precious friend for a Conference of Churches that I love gave me peace. Thirty years after having worked with Harry at Hillcrest Church in Sioux Falls, I'm now working with Harry in Edmonton!

## What are some key lessons you've learned on your journey in ministry thus far?

I've lately learned that ministry doesn't always need to be a formal role. The things I'm doing now I also recognize as ministry. I feel at peace with this season of my life.

Another lesson is that God continually weaves our relationships together and mentoring is my heart. I have many

stories; for example, Jim Schneider's son Dave went through our youth ministry as a student. Dave was in turn called to the youth ministry and became the successor of my position at McKernan. This and many other ministry relationships are still interwoven by God to this day.

I've also learned a lot about working with my spouse. Terry has always made a point to champion me and my gifts. We have identified how our gifts balance each other, which helps us succeed as a team. For example, he is good at building structure and strategy, and I am good at filling in the relational aspects and carrying things forward. We are comfortable handing things off to each other and work hard on communication and honesty. As a couple we've also learned the importance of setting church topics aside to make space for other conversations and interests.

As a mother working in ministry, I learned to allow my children to have their own space for relationships within the church, independent of me. For example, if there were conflicts with specific people, we made a point to not tell our children all the details. Although they were aware of challenges, it allowed them to not have their church relationships be colored by conflicts behind the scenes.

God has also spoken to me numerous times about my personal capacity. If I run out of having enough for myself, I have nothing left to offer to anyone else. God seems more concerned with who He has called me to be than what He has called me to do. This means saying no sometimes.

Related to this, I've learned God's calling continues through the many seasons of my life. Sometimes I have had to step back and sometimes I have been led to step in. My job has been to discern: What is God's voice

to me now? The stops and starts I've experienced have been the right things to do, and God has provided what I've needed through each season.

And finally, as a woman working in ministry I've learned the importance of having good people as mentors in my life to help me navigate the unique challenges. I've also learned to set my mind on the pathway of faithfulness and surrendering to the Lord, during external struggles.

Working faithfully builds trust, and God provides what I need in terms of confirmation and perspective about my calling. With good mentors and an attitude that I'll go where God calls me to go, I've felt equipped for ministry.

## Are there any books you'd recommended to our readers?

I recently read *Gentle and Lowly* by Dean Ortland, which explores Christ's heart toward us. I've also always appreciated Mark Buchanan. His thoughts about Sabbath in *The Rest of God* were foundational for me; as well as *Spiritual Rhythm* as a resource for those exploring seasons of life and ministry.

### Any final thoughts for our readers?

My life verse has been Isaiah 58:11-12, which I personalize to describe me as a well-watered garden and has words full of promise for my life's ministry. But then verse 13 follows with a warning to keep the Sabbath. I can only fulfill God's calling if I take His offer of restoration and filling. My heart is to place my relationship with Jesus above my service so that I can serve out of the outflow of my relationship with Him. This is something I would encourage for all women called to ministry.

n added joy to our trip to Bismarck, ND for a regional luncheon was being able to visit the new US White Cross Distribution Center. After 10 years, Quest church in Royse,Texas, handed the baton over to Century Baptist in Bismarck, ND in November 2020.

Fabiola and I were amazed at the way God had prepared Century to graciously and excitedly take that baton and run with great determination to continue the mission to get needed medical supplies from our NAB churches to Cameroon hospitals and medical centers that we had seen during our visit to Cameroon.

Not only did God have a facility ready and waiting, but He had a team at Century ready and willing to breathe new life into this vital NAB ministry. Debbie and Dan Long are project managers and their dedication has been contagious as they work through

every detail to get the baby layettes—baby blankets, diapers, bandages, absorbent squares, sheets, pillowcases, hospital supplies, guest house supplies, and other medical supplies from our NAB churches to the distribution center in Cameroon.

Debbie Long shares: We at Century Baptist have been on a great adventure and learning curve for the past year and a half. Not only was this new to us,

> but we began during the challenging covid years. In order for this ministry to work, we have needed capable men, women and children to give of their time, energy, resources and talents.

One of the earliest desires that God

placed on my heart, was to make the items we produced easy enough to include the next generation, our youth. Bandage rollers were redesigned to make them kid friendly and easy for anyone to roll bandages. Crystal Springs Camp in Medina, North Dakota was thrilled to have a hands-on mission-based project for all campers. The first summer, they rolled over 5,000 bandages. This past summer, they did close to that amount, but also began producing 4" squares.

At Century, kids from Kindergarten though High School participate in White Cross nights with our Middle School students, under April Wahl's direction, taking a very active roll. They are capable and they so enjoy producing needed supplies.

We have a faithful group of women who meet weekly to inspect items and process fabric and other materials into items needed as listed in the White Cross Handbook. Over 60 women have participated since February 2021. Many of these women shared how lonely, isolated and even depressed they felt during covid. Participating in White Cross was vital to their recovery.

Please be with them continually and just thank you God, for all the volunteers, employees and service. I hope people would humble themselves and have more compassion for others and a hunger for You.

### The Women of "Significant"

Significant – Six Ordinary Women, One Extraordinary God A Study of the Women in Jesus' Genealogy

In this issue we will look at the last two women in Rachel Risner's list of six women significant in the genealogy of Jesus Christ. Previously we looked at the lives of SARAH, a woman of beauty; LEAH, a woman of worship; TAMAR, a woman of mercy; and RAHAB, a woman of courage.


Now we will look briefly at RUTH, a woman of tenacity; and BATHSHEBA, a woman of influence. Two more women that God used in the most unexpected ways.

## RUTH From pauper to princess A woman of tenacity

By following her heart, and doing what she knew was right, Ruth went from being a foreigner to being someone who was respected, blessed and honoured. She came to be known for her faithfulness, loyalty, virtue and love. The Bible talks of her as being a hard worker and one who takes care of those she loves. How did all this happen to a young girl from Moab?

Let's look at the characters in this drama:

- Ruth, a young foreign widow without family or prospects who became an ancestor of Jesus
- Naomi, her shrewd mother-in-law who told her how to get a second husband
- Boaz, the wealthy Israelite who married Ruth and became the father of Obed
- Orpah, the second daughter-in-law of Naomi who turned her back on Naomi and left her
- The women of Bethlehem, who had their own part to play in the story



Ruth, whose name means "companion" or "friend", was a true friend to her mother-in-law and stayed with her after the deaths of their husbands, even leaving her own land and people to go with Naomi back to her ancestral home in Bethlehem. There her hard work brought her to the attention of Boaz, and a beautiful story of love and redemption developed.

Ruth had remarkable faith. Faith that there was a purpose for her ahead; faith that God was who He said He was; faith that God would provide all she needed. And God rewarded her with healing, provision and love. God had a plan for Ruth. She followed Him with tenacity and He brought her victory and many blessings.

### BATHSHEBA From invisible to influential A woman of influence

The story of Bathsheba, how David saw her bathing and was attracted to her; how he had her husband killed in battle so he could marry her; how she became the mother of the wise King Solomon – all this we know well and have heard often. In fact, she is not named with her own name in the genealogy of Jesus, but merely referred to as "Uriah's wife".

So who was Bathsheba really? We know, first of all, that both Bathsheba's father and husband were men of good character – strong, valiant, faithful, mighty men in King David's army. And Bathsheba was beautiful! But we also find, as her life goes on, that she was a capable and gifted woman. She was a most beguiling person – people were fascinated by her.

When she became David's wife, she also became Queen, and in this role she flourished. Though she lost that first child, she next bore Solomon, who was destined to become Israel's next king. She also bore David 3 more children. This family became a powerful bond for David, though the consequences of his sin earlier would have implications for the rest of his life.

But Bathsheba became of queen of wisdom and influence. She plays a huge role in the story of the people of Israel as wife and mother as well. It is speculated that the woman of Proverbs 31 was Bathsheba – a woman of influence in her family and in her community.

We see of Bathsheba – "A woman who fears the Lord, she shall be praised." God took a situation that first brought grief and loss and redeemed it for Bathsheba's gain. He enabled her to become a woman of godly influence – a woman who spoke wise words humbly, embracing each opportunity put before her by the King of her heart.

We pray that we would be the same wise and humble influencers over others – true servants of our extraordinary God.

We realized that we could purchase the videos of speakers, worship music and breakout sessions as a Host Church for about CAN\$ 400 – perfect! We could hear fantastic women – Jennie Allan, Sadie Robertson Huff, Christine Caine, Jackie Hill Perry, and many more. We could join in worship with a great band and vocalists. We could use their advertising and graphics. It was just what we wanted.

So, we held an IF:Gathering mini-conference on a Friday evening and Saturday morning. We served goodies on Friday night, breakfast on Saturday morning, and ended with Saturday lunch. We gave each lady a goodie bag. We charged \$25/each so the registrants were committed to coming. And we had a wonderful time together.

A word of caution: you need to preview the speakers and make sure their content is suitable for your audience. Out of the 15 speakers available, we chose 5. And you need to set aside some time after each speaker for table discussion to digest what you just heard (each speaker is about 20 minutes long). We held this mini-conference in September, and it was a good kick-off for the fall activities. It was a great blessing and joy to the ladies that attended.
