A Study of Women in Jesus' Genealogy by Rachel Risner


In our last TouchPoint – Spring 2022 - we looked at the first two ordinary women in Rachel Risner's book "Significant" – but how God used Sarah and Leah in the most unexpected ways. Let's look at two more of these women, and see how God used "not perfect" women to carry out His perfect plan!

TAMAR – from Forsaken to Foremother

enesis 38 interrupts the story of Joseph to tell the absolutely bizarre story regarding one of Joseph's brothers, Judah, and his relationship with his daughter-in-law, Tamar.

Judah, himself, had married a woman from Canaan, and then chosen another Canaanite woman, Tamar, for his oldest son. It happened that her first husband died, leaving her childless. It was the custom at the time to then marry the widow off to the next brother, which is what happened to Tamar. Again, this second husband also died, leaving her still childless.

Her father-in-law, Judah, should then have married her to his youngest son, but he was fearful he would also died, so he delayed, leaving Tamar in a state of limbo. This was an inexcusable neglect of his fatherly duties and an



injustice to Tamar.

Though a Canaanite, Tamar was intent on belonging to Judah's family and being part of God's people. So here Tamar took matters into her own hands. She tricked Judah into sleeping with her, and actually became pregnant with twin boys through that encounter. When all this came to light a few months later, Judah at first tried to paint her as a scheming prostitute.

But being a man of honour, and filled with guilt, Judah recognized his sin and acknowledged his own unrighteousness in his failure to provide for his daughter-in-law. He publicly announced Tamar's innocence, actually calling her more righteous than he was!

So we find in Tamar the story of hope and purpose. Though Tamar's life was filled with deception and seduction, she was used of God despite past mistakes. She showed traits of assertiveness, coupled with deep family loyalty and true mercy. Her kindness brought Judah to repentance and restored his relationship with God.

Tamar did not know the full significance of her life on earth, nor do we know ours. But there is a purpose – God has a perfect plan. Tamar bore Judah two sons. The lineage of one of these sons, Perez, included Boaz, King David, and ultimately Christ Himself. We can see the transformation of Judah, as he was willing to sacrifice himself for his brother Benjamin – Judah became a man worthy of a royal line.

This is a story of God's prevailing mercy – even the most flawed of us can be used and blessed by God, not because of our merit, but because of His grace.

Now let's look at RAHAB – from Zero to Hero

In the book of Joshua, we are introduced to one of the most thought-provoking and astonishing heroines of the Bible. Rahab, a prostitute in the Canaanite city of Jericho, ultimately is noteworthy for her great faith and her place in the lineage of Jesus. Looking closely at her life shows us how God deals with individual believers with grace and mercy.

We all know the story – Rahab lived in Jericho and assisted the Israelites in capturing the city by hiding the two men who had been sent to scout out the city prior to the attack. Because of her courage and assistance, Rahab and all her family were protected and were brought out of the city and included among the Israelite people. She married Salmon, an Israelite from the tribe of Judah. Her son was Boaz, the husband of Ruth, and a direct line in the lineage of Jesus.

Rahab was an unlikely candidate for a hero of faith. However, she recognized that the God of Israel was the God above all, and this faith, coupled by courageous action, saved her family. Her past was no longer viewed as an unclean prostitute, but as one worthy by grace to be part of the lineage of Jesus.

It is clear that Rahab was perceptive, intelligent and wellinformed. She identified the spies, and was able to hide them successfully. She asked for her family's safety and agreed to the conditions set out by the two spies.

Rahab left a remarkable legacy of courage, faith and hope. Through her we learn of God's saving grace through faith, no matter the past. Rahab, through a grand act of courage, is truly a woman of faith.

NAB WOMEN IN MINISTRY LEADERSHIP

An Interview with Kayo Kyusai

We have been highlighting women connected to NAB who are serving in ministry leadership within their churches and communities. Our hope is by doing so, we can encourage and support other NAB women in leadership. I would like to introduce you to Kayo Kyusai (pronounced Q-sigh). Mrs. Kyusai has been a member of Komyo Christian Church in Izumi, Osaka, Japan since 2016 where she is a valuable leader. She is also active in the community, doing seasonal work at the city office, participating in a local gospel choir at the community center, and volunteering in an organization which supports people with the same illness she has.

How did you meet Jesus?

I met the true Jesus through Anointed Gospel Choir and our teacher, Mr. Yamamoto. He has a lovely, pure heart and truly loves Jesus. This actually turned me off because I thought that there was no way I could ever be like that. I used to give him a hard time, you might even say I persecuted him. I like to sing and wanted to do more solo work, so I left the choir for a while trying to find a place to sing, especially gospel music or jazz. However, it wasn't long until I returned to the choir. My time away taught me that this choir was singing and learning the Truth. Through Mr. Yamamoto and another gospel teacher from the US, as well as from Shan, I gradually came to understand that I am a sinner in need of a Savior. On Christmas Day 2011 I was baptized along with one of my good friends from the gospel choir.

You were not baptized at Komyo Christian Church. What brought you to the church?

After I was baptized, I started attending a different church with my friend who played piano for me when I sang solo gospel concerts. I enjoyed attending that church, however, it was in another city over an hour away. One day the pastor encouraged me

to find a church near my home if I was truly serious in my desire for my husband to become a follower of Jesus. I was a bit hurt when the pastor told me to find a new church, but as we talked through it, I could see how God led me to Komyo Church. I had met Shan at the gospel choir, and we had started to study the Bible together even while I was attending the other church. Just as God had worked in my heart over time to help me become a believer, he also brought me to Komyo Christian Church.

What roles do you have in leadership at Komyo Christian Church?

First of all, I have to say that these are all roles I took on because they needed to be done not because I was seeking any leadership roles! I want to serve God and give him glory, but I did not expect to have these leadership roles, especially as an elder. There are others who have been Christians much longer than I have and who have more experience. However, here I am, serving God. I believe this is part of how God is teaching me to be a disciple. I also help lead music, singing and playing the keyboard, and doing the accounting.



As you volunteer and work in the community, are you able to talk about your faith?

Yes, all of my coworkers and fellow volunteers know I am a Christian. One of the first things I say when I sign up for something is that I am a Christian so I cannot help on Sundays because I need to go to church. I am always listening for the Holy Spirit's prompts to share even the smallest thing about Jesus. We must take every chance we are given to talk about Jesus! The ladies in the gospel choir all know I am a Christian, but I am learning how to talk to each one differently because of their personality or understanding or situation.


What are some challenges of being a Christian in Japan?

One big challenge for me is funerals. Almost everyone has a Buddhist funeral even though most people do not believe or even understand the tenets of the religion. It is just a ritual that everyone does and

NAB WOMEN IN MINISTRY LEADERSHIP

hen I introduce myself I often say, "I was made in Japan but born in Canada!" I was born and raised in Alberta and came to have a relationship with Jesus through a camp ministry at the age of 10. While attending North American Baptist College in Edmonton, I received a calling to serve in full-time ministry. I have been serving in Japan close to 16 years (including my shortterm years) as a missionary with NAB and have visited and worshipped in many of the churches here in the Japan Baptist Conference. I noticed right away that the churches are mostly made up of women. Some of the churches used to have a women's ministry about 20 years ago, but has since died out along with the aging population. Currently out of 10 churches, only 2 have any particular ministry for women.

The Covid pandemic has highlighted several things to me. One is the human tendency to be drawn to ease and portraying an image on a screen and hiding behind a mask. I've also learned that isolation is truly not healthy. Culturally, Japanese have been raised to believe that it is acceptable to put on "a mask" of politeness and respectability and portray a different self to others for the sake of "harmony" amongst others. Even though I did not grow up in Japan, my Japanese-born

parents taught me this unconsciously through their parenting style. So, I very much lean towards this tendency. It is not easy to be vulnerable and to be honest, but I believe this kind of communication is needed within our Christian communities for greater spiritual growth. I believe we need mentors who can model this for us and encourage us. I was able to have mentors like this in my own life and have also experienced this kind of safe, trusting community with my spiritual sisters in Christ in North America. It was not until I could share my deepest struggles with another and pray together and learn from Scripture and be accountable to someone that my spiritual walk with God felt alive and empowered by the Holy Spirit. Personally, I feel this kind of relationship is most comfortable with another sister in Christ. I believe encouraging a more active women's ministry in the Japanese churches is essential, especially after experiencing the pandemic which has encouraged even more isolation. One of our theme verses is Hebrews 10: 24-25: "And let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds, not giving up meeting

together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another—and all the more as you see the Day approaching." (NIV)

Since 2021, I have introduced and explained a vision for a denomination-wide women's ministry to the pastors of the Japan Baptist churches via one-on-one zoom meetings. The vision for a JBC women's ministry was accepted by the leadership of the JBC. I made a video presentation and also had the pastors share their opinions and questions. It's so important that the pastors are on-board with this and thankfully most are! A major part of our ministry to women is to facilitate Ladies seminars. Shan Reed and I have been facilitating these seminars for several years in the Osaka region with positive responses and the sense that women are hungry for this kind of training. Our goal is to reach the 4 regions (Osaka, Aichi, Nara/Kyoto, and Mie) of the Japan Baptist Conference churches with these seminars which facilitate a greater interactive style of learning and encourages deeper sharing with one another. I also have with the

permission of the pastors to pray with and mentor at least one woman leader from their church. The time spent with these leaders continue to be mutually encouraging.

What are the goals and dreams for the future? Eventually, these are some of the goals we have:

- 1. We would like to have a women's committee formed at the denominational level.
- 2. To have the Ladies Seminars start and continue in each region. So far, we have only reached 2 regions. (Osaka and Aichi)
- 3. To encourage the women leaders of each church to mentor someone else in their church and to start envisioning a greater ministry there.
- 4. To have retreats or other leadership training.

We have been also asked to envision a partnership of some kind with our North American sister churches and their women's ministry groups. This is something that we can definitely pray about and start thinking about. I say this with the understanding that the JBC churches are still taking baby steps towards a women's ministry focus and that changes take much more time.

Since the Japanese churches are not yet equipped to organize big projects yet, I am wondering if a women's ministry in a church in North America has a project that they feel women from Japan can contribute to and work on together.

Some suggestions on my end are: It might mean at first setting up a zoom meeting and getting to know each other. Sending video prayer letters/testimonies to one another. Having a missional project where both sides can contribute either financially or in other ways.

there is a lot of pressure to participate in the rituals. As I have come to understand Jesus more, it makes me sad to see everyone participating without understanding.

I am grateful to have faith in Jesus. I know I can bring my problems to him and trust him even when I do not see or understand the outcome. Japanese people think they can do everything themselves. That is a heavy burden to bear.

How can people in North America be praying for Komyo Christian Church?

First, I want to say thank you! Thank you for your prayers for us for many years. When I became a leader at the church, I came to understand how much you all support us not only through prayer but also through sending missionaries like Shan and the Ewings and Yuri. If we had not had them at the beginning, we could not have survived financially.


Thank you for your support!
