



NAB Retired Workers' Retreat Reflections

To call this a retreat for retired workers is something of a misnomer. For sure, most of those in attendance at the Cedar Springs Retreat Center near Sumas, Washington, May 13–15, have technically achieved retirement status. In welcoming attendees to Sumas, I reflected on the life of former NAB missionary, Bee Westerman,¹ who often described retirement in automotive terms of “putting on four new tires.” Although attendees are no longer full-time pastors or missionaries, they have “re-tired” and continued to find ways to serve God in their local churches and communities.

The Sumas retreat might well be characterized as a North American Baptist family reunion. It is a family gathering in which seminary friends and classmates from forty-five to fifty years ago are able to reconnect; in which former missionary colleagues recall the joys and challenges of service in places like Cameroon, Japan, and Brazil; in which pastors who have served as colleagues in NAB churches across North America can renew friendships, revisit ministry highlights from years gone by, and share how God is using them in their retirement years; and in which individuals who are meeting for the first time feel free to disclose personal joys and pains. Every time another car arrived and the door to the lodge opened, the family spirit intensified as folks greeted each other with handshakes, hugs, and laughter.

To complement this familial atmosphere, our time included good food and sitting together around tables.

Table prayers were generally sung as reminders of God’s good blessings in our lives. Time at the tables led to conversations about family, ministry, and life experiences. Around these tables we had a few new faces, mine included. I was given the chance to promote the NAB Heritage Commission, relating the story of Venturia Baptist Church in North Dakota, from which God has called missionaries and pastors. Missionary Yuri Nakano shared her faith journey, as well as her ministries in Japan. Chris Gorman spoke about God’s incredible grace and provisions for our lives and shared how opportunities for ministry are all around us.

Even as different people shared of physical ailments, what we did not find among this group was a sense of despair or uselessness. Even in retirement, these workers are living into what became an underlying theme of the retreat: “pulpits come in many shapes and sizes” and “everyone has a pulpit.” These faithful workers have re-tired and discovered new pulpits from which to live out their faith in local churches and in their homes and communities, through teaching Sunday school, serving as a medical director for a hospice / home health organization, organizing and hosting a neighborhood Bible study, organizing White Cross shipments, etc. That is reason to praise God.

John and Millie went on to pastor churches in Minnesota, Michigan, Ohio, and Iowa.
