WHAT FOOTPRINTS ARE YOU LEAVING?

We all leave footprints. They might be small or large, but we all leave them. God uses each of us in special ways as we walk with him, and thus, we leave special footprints.

These past few months, again we have seen many of our NAB family members enter into their rewards in Heaven. Each of these fellow workers should be recognized by the footprints they left. The next few pages contain stories of some of these.

One of these is Bernie Lemke. His pathway started in 1938 in Poland. At the age of six, his footprints were seen in the great flight to freedom from Prussia to Germany. Walking for 800 kilometers, they found family in Germany. His reunion with his father happened unexpectedly when one day he appeared out of nowhere from prison.

The family immigrated to Canada, settling settled in Edmonton, where Bernie received his education. The Lord brought Lilly into his life, and after marrying in 1963, they walked together for sixty years in ministry. When Bernie was a young student, he learned the trade of carpentry, which contributed to his footprints. Building churches from British

Columbia to Manitoba as a young married man, and then to Cameroon and Nigeria, he modeled, built, and reinforced over seventy-five buildings. His mark is seen on hospitals, schools, mission homes, and retirement homes in many locations. They lived in the retirement home Bernie built in Alberta for twenty years before they moved to British Columbia, where he was still working on projects just weeks before his retirement to Heaven.

He took his young family to Cameroon. He built buildings, lives, and his own young family. He took missionaries and nationals aside to show them how to build sanctuaries, hospitals, clean water facilities, and homes. He left his footprints where God could be honored. After his first retirement, he took his family and friends back to Africa to enjoy God's ministry in those buildings and to glorify the name of God in ministry.


77, passed away in Edmonton, Alberta, on January 10, 2024, due to a
