OUR TRIENNIAL LUNCHEON PROJECT Saker Baptist College Water Project CAMEROON, WEST AFRICA



Women's Connection will encourage those who attend the luncheon to share in the improvement of the water system at Saker Baptist College for girls in Cameroon through an offering. Maureen Moody shares about the necessity of improving the present water system.

Saker Baptist College is a secondary school for girls in Cameroon. It was one of the first secondary schools started by NAB missionaries. It has a long, prestigious history and since 1962 it has been providing an environment that encourages and empowers young women to learn, to grow and to lead.


YOU GLOW GIRL Bismarck North Dakota

What a fun-filled, inspirational night for girls from grades 5-8 Middle School Ministry at Century Baptist in Bismarck, North Dakota. April Wahl and her team prepared an opportunity for Century girls to connect with Jesus, each other, and their leaders, leaning into their identity belonging as Kingdom workers.

The girls found out what it means to glow as a light in this world, not just individually but collectively so that the world can see Jesus.

Beginning with a student population of 36 in 1962, Saker has flourished and currently has an enrollment of 1131 students. Over the years buildings have been added and bore holes drilled to provide a water source for the school. While the bore holes are able to produce a good amount of water the challenge is to get the water to the various buildings. When the taps are opened on the lower side of the property the higher side taps just trickle and then stop all together.



Saker graduates receive a wholistic education that includes Bible classes and they are well prepared to continue on to further education.

This means the girls stand in line for hours waiting to fill their buckets and get washed up before school. The system is inadequate for the number of people relying on the water.

The parents of the students have raised funds to update parts of the school and former students -Sakerettes - have also made generous contributions to Saker. Due to the low tuition and boarding fees the school charges, Saker is unable to fund big capital projects independently. This is where we can help. With an input of \$14,000 the water situation can be remedied. New flexible pipes will replace the old broken metal pipes, 2 additional storage tanks and one new water pump will be installed and control valves and water distribution points will be added. This will then provide adequate water for the students and staff at the school as well as provide a source of clean water for the approximately 200 people in the surrounding community.

Assisting in the water project to support Saker Baptist College is an

opportunity to support Christian based education and empowerment of young women in Cameroon. Saker Baptist College has been impacting the world for over 60 years. The graduates of the school are called Sakerettes and they have chapters in many countries. Saker graduates receive a wholistic education that includes Bible classes and they are well prepared to continue on to further education. This is apparent from the careers they are active in; engineers, pharmacists, lawyers, doctors and church leaders. They are also represented in top ranking administrative positions, government positions and two are currently serving as members of the Cameroon Supreme Court. The kingdom influence these women have in Cameroon and abroad is significant.

Leaderhip Interview Maureen Moody



Women's Connection has been highlighting women connected to NABC who are serving in ministry leadership within their churches, communities and in foreign environments as missionaries.

Maureen Moody is featured in this issue. Enjoy the story of her life and her commitment to God as He daily leads her, encourages her and gives her strength.

Please begin by telling us about your personal history and testimony (where you were born, grew up, met Craig, career choices – anything that gives us a picture of your background).

My life began in Medicine Hat, Alberta, Canada where my mission-minded NAB parents - Clarence and Shirl Semrau hosted missionaries and were involved in missions trips themselves too. I grew up in Calgary, accepted Christ at age 5 and was baptized at age 9 at Brentview Baptist church.

After graduating from nursing school I headed to Cameroon. In Bamenda, Cameroon at a Christmas banquet a friend assigned half the single missionary guys to sit at my table and half to her table. Little did she know this banquet would be a life changing event for Craig and me. After we completed our terms in Cameroon the Portland, Oregon native and I began married life in Calgary. We didn't stay there long however, as we landed back in Cameroon on our third wedding anniversary. Since that time we have served many years in Cameroon.

Share with us what led you to serve in Cameroon. Did any other mission experiences prepare you for this opportunity (calling)?

My family encouraged me to consider missions and the influence of my great aunt Trudy Schatz (former NAB Missionary Nurse/Midwife) also impacted my steps. Short term mission trips also confirmed God was leading me to serve overseas.

Tell us about how you have and are serving in Cameroon. Please include where you are living and what your role is currently.

I have served in Cameroon Baptist

Convention hospitals, health centres and with the Life Abundant Program (LAP). I have been involved in direct patient care as a ward nurse and as a consulting nurse. In Education, I have taught continuing education for nurses as well as an extensive training program for village health workers.

Currently I am the school nurse for Rain Forest International School but most of my time is spent as the Acting NAB Field Director for Cameroon. This leadership role involves overseeing our NAB missionaries and supporting them as needed in their ministry areas and assisting them in safety and security issues. I also liaise with CBC leaders regarding ways we are partnering and can partner together. I chair the Crisis Relief Committee and with the CBC leaders we determine how to best use the funds we receive to aid the thousands of people that are impacted by the conflict in the NW and SW Regions of Cameroon. I also spend a lot of time coordinating White Cross activities with CBC health services in Cameroon and with White Cross volunteers in North America.

What part of missionary work do you enjoy most or find most rewarding? Challenging? What excites you about the leadership opportunities you have in Cameroon?

I love spending time with people and working together to set goals and make plans to accomplish those goals. I love looking into challenging situations and finding solutions. I enjoy the independence of missionary life and the continual opportunities to learn about other cultures. I love how God teaches me through people from all walks of life and diverse backgrounds. My most challenging times are when the solutions cannot be found and I experience frustration and discouragement. At those times I'm sent back to my knees in prayer. And I am so thankful for the incredible faithfulness of God! He shows that to me over and over again.

My leadership role in Cameroon is so interesting. On one hand I work with North American missionaries and on the other I work with leaders in the Cameroon Baptist Convention. I love the variety. I especially enjoy working with CBC leaders as they share their ideas and plans for furthering kingdom work in Cameroon.

In light of all of the joys and challenges you have had and are experiencing do you have any nuggets of wisdom to offer other women?

- 1. Remember God is faithful! You are not alone and God gives wisdom to those who ask for it.
- 2. It's okay to be afraid just remember Psalm 56:3 "When I am afraid, I put my trust in you." and then remember the first point!


Share a little about your children—and how you stay connected with them.



We long for home.



Alive Lifeway Women


